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Agency Policy

Response to incidents of domestic violence and violations of related court orders shall stress enforcement of the law to protect the victim and shall communicate the philosophy that domestic violence is criminal behavior

It is also policy to facilitate victims' and offenders' access to appropriate civil remedies and community resources whenever feasible





Definitions

Domestic Violence

physical, psychological, sexual or emotional abuse by one member of a family or household against another member of the family or household

Domestic Incident

includes criminal and family offenses and may also include disputes between family or household members that don't rise to the level of an offense



Definitions



Members of same family or household

- Related by blood or marriage (in-laws)
- Legally married or formerly married
- Child in common
- Intimate relationship

When the nature of a relationship is <u>unclear</u> and reasonable cause to believe exists that a crime involving a family offense occurred, officers shall proceed under this policy as if the parties are members of the same family or household.





Definitions

<u>Intimate relationship</u> – Factors to consider

The nature or type of relationship, regardless of whether the relationship is sexual in nature

The frequency of interaction between the persons

The duration of the relationship

**Neither a casual acquaintance nor ordinary fraternization between two individuals in business or social contexts shall be deemed to constitute an intimate relationship **





Domestic Incident Reporting



All incidents must be reported

Reporting Officer must **notify** a Supervisor when

- parties cannot be found (10-19) (Policy 311.6.1)
- incident already reported (void) (Policy 311.6.1)
- allegations of physical contact b/w parties

Supervisor must respond to scene when no arrest is made, and

- suspect has a pistol license
- any party sustained a physical injury
- threat or use of deadly weapon/dangerous instrument
- any act relating to COB



MANDATORY ARREST

Officers **shall** arrest for:

Any Felony

Any Misdemeanor family offense involving physical violence or threat thereof regardless of victim wishes

Any Misdemeanor family offense in accord with victim wishes

A stay away VOP

A refrain from VOP if a family offense

A Violation when victim signs civilian arrest

A Violation committed in officer's presence and victim does not request otherwise

Officers not required to arrest both parties

Justification Defense



Nothing contained in this [law/procedure] shall be deemed to require the arrest of any person when the officer reasonably believes the person's conduct is justifiable under article thirty-five of title C of the Penal Law
















Domestic Violence Recidivism Reduction



Scoring system using 8 risk items to asses the likelihood of reoffending in DV Cases

Algorithm assigns between 0-13 points (13 highest)

Developed by Dr. Kris Henning of Portland State University

Danger Assessment Survey

- Distribute when any offense is alleged or committed :
 - Danger Assessment Cover Page
 - Danger Assessment Questionnaire
 - Danger Assessment Calendar Page
- Brief explanation to victim tool that will help them evaluate the risk of being subjected to future domestic violence in their relationship.
- Direct victim to contact agencies on cover page.

(Red Flag Law)





Red Flag Laws

 Family members, teachers, and law enforcement are often the <u>first people to see</u> <u>the warning signs</u> when a person is in crisis and is considering harming themselves or others

 Red Flag laws empower those who recognize the warning signs to intervene in order to temporarily prevent someone in crisis from accessing firearms





Red Flag Laws

- Following Connecticut's increased enforcement of its red flag law, one study found the law to be associated with a 14 percent reduction in the state's firearm suicide rate. Another study in Connecticut found that one suicide was averted for approximately every 11 gun removals carried out under the law
- In Indiana, in the 10 years after the state passed its Extreme Risk law in 2005, the state's firearm suicide rate decreased by 7.5 percent. Like Connecticut, another study estimated that Indiana's Extreme Risk law averted one suicide for approximately every 10 gun removals

A Civil Order

Civil Practice Rules and Law (CPLR) Article 63-A

Issued to a **PETITIONER**

Commands a <u>RESPONDENT</u> to surrender firearms

Both Temporary & Permanent versions







A police officer (CPL§1.20)

A district attorney (in county where respondent resides)

A family or household member (SSL §459-A(2))

A school administrator or designee (EDN §1125)

A physician, nurse, therapist, etc.







In accordance with this article, a petitioner may file an application...Provided, however, that a petitioner who is a police officer or district attorney

SHALL

file such application upon the receipt of <u>credible</u> <u>information</u> that an individual is likely to engage in conduct that would result in serious harm



Family/Household Member



- (a) persons related by consanguinity or affinity;
- (b) persons legally married to one another;
- (c) persons formerly married to one another;
- (d) persons who have a child in common;
- (e) unrelated persons who are continually or at regular intervals living in the same household or who have in the past
- (f) persons who have been in an intimate relationship regardless of whether such persons have lived together; or
- (g) any other category of individuals deemed to be a victim of domestic violence as defined by the office of children and family services in regulation.

Probable cause that respondent is likely to engage in conduct that would result in serious harm to himself or others as defined in MHL §9.39



MHL §9.39



"Likelihood to result in serious harm" as used in this article shall mean:

- substantial risk of physical harm to himself as manifested by threats of or attempts at suicide or serious bodily harm or <u>other conduct demonstrating</u> <u>that he is dangerous</u> to himself, or
- 2. substantial risk of physical harm to other persons as manifested by homicidal or other <u>violent</u> <u>behavior</u> by which others <u>are placed in reasonable fear</u> of serious physical harm.



TERPO



Factors to consider:

- (a) a threat or act of violence or use of physical force directed toward self, the petitioner, or another person;
- (b) a violation or alleged violation of an order of protection;
- (c) any pending charge or conviction for an offense involving the use of a weapon;
- (d) the reckless use, display or brandishing of a firearm, rifle or shotgun;
- (e) any history of a violation of an extreme risk protection order;
- (f) evidence of recent or ongoing abuse of controlled substances or alcohol; or
- (g) evidence of recent acquisition of a firearm, rifle, shotgun or other deadly weapon or dangerous instrument, or any ammunition therefor.

Final Hearing

Petitioner still has burden

Clear and Convincing standard

"the evidence is highly and substantially more likely to be true than untrue"

Court considers same factors as TERPO

Respondent may challenge evidence presented by petitioner

Respondent may present their own evidence



ERPO



If Permanent Order issued

Temporarily suspend firearms licenses

Direct Respondent to surrender all firearms

Court notifies DCJS, FBI, et. al.

Order valid for Up To one year

Respondent has One opportunity to request re-hearing



Beyond ERPO



Respondent may request a hearing to vacate or amend the order once during the term of the order

Petitioner may renew the order within 60 days of its expiration

In order to recover guns once order expires, Respondent must:

Make written application to court

On notice to Petitioner & Licensing Officer
